ART Connects Us

In November, Bryan Area Foundation Trustees approved the establishment of a new

project fund to support the fundraising efforts of a new collaborative community project

to benefit the performing arts in Bryan, Ohio.

Established by Bryan City Schools with a \$100,000 donation pledged by community members, Dr. George and Julie Brown, the **ART Connects Us Project Fund** will be used to revitalize the historic Arts and Education Center building located at 325 W. High St. This property was the original site of the Bryan High School, opened in 1903. In 1917, the auditorium and gymnasium were added. Since that time, the building has undergone multiple transitions and served many purposes. Since 2020, a sizable portion of the building has remained unused. Escalating maintenance issues, the ability to utilize a Brownfield Remediation Grant, and interest by community groups, the City, and Bryan City Schools to invest in the arts led to the opening of the fund.

Bryan City Schools Superintendent Mark Rairigh notes that capital improvements to the Arts & Education Center building are fully aligned with the district's commitment to "best in class" facilities supporting not only the Arts but also Education and Athletics as

well. With the recent capital improvements to the athletics complex nearing completion and the STEM innovation center supporting academic needs nearing groundbreaking, the Arts & Education Center building renovation is very timely. The **ART Connects Us** project will address the removal and remediation of the former classrooms and gymnasium, will add a much-needed fellowship space, accessible restroom facilities, and will bring the performing arts technology up to the twenty-first century.

Bryan native, community member, and arts advocate Russ Davies is leading the **ART Connects Us** capital campaign. Russ notes the value of the arts in our community goes well beyond just self-expression and enjoyment. A strong arts culture, and especially the facilities to support it, creates shared experiences and has social and generational impact. As the current President of Bryan Development, Russ also notes the project's role in the continued momentum and revitalization taking place in downtown Bryan.

George and Julie Brown also noted the location and history of the Arts & Education Center building as primary reasons for their interest in supporting the cause. Having previously been a part of prior renovations of the Arts & Education Center

building, and having participated in supporting the recent Bryan City Schools athletics project, they were excited to be a part of establishing a fund to support the arts in Bryan. As George and Julie often say, quoting anthropologist Margaret Mead, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world, indeed, it's the only thing that ever has."

The Millcreek-West Unity Foundation recently awarded three \$5,000 grants to local organizations.

The Hilltop High School Athletic Department received a grant to support honor roll scholars in grades 3-12 and all K-2 students to attend school-sponsored home sporting events for free. In the first quarter of the school year, 362 pupils qualified for the program and are now able to support their classmates in their athletic endeavors.

- \$5,000 was granted to the Brady Township Fire Department to purchase battery-powered TNT rescue tools. The funding allows firefighters to replace their hydraulic tools with lighter batterypowered ones, starting with the Jaws of Life.
- A \$5,000 grant was given to the Village of West Unity to help build an inclusive playground in Wabash Park, allowing children and families of all physical, mental, and social abilities the opportunity to play together.



The Montpelier Area Foundation awarded \$4,000 in grants due to the generosity of Montpelier resident Janet Bennett. Those monies will be used for the following:

- \$1,000 to Montpelier Parks and Recreation for their summer tie-dye T-shirt program

Bryan Grants

B.I.G. Grant Program

Bryan Development accepted a \$30,000 grant from the Bryan Area Foundation for its Business Improvement Grant (B.I.G.)

program. The purpose of the B.I.G. program is to encourage economic development, increase occupancy, improve aesthetics and building facades, address safety issues, and extend the lifecycle of existing historic buildings in the downtown Bryan, Ohio, commercial district. Sanctuary Homeless Shelter

The Sanctuary Homeless Shelter received a \$15,000 grant from the Bryan Area Foundation to help it replace its carpeting. Vinyl flooring will be installed that is long-lasting, scratch—and burn-resistant, waterproof, and more manageable. The goal is to have the work done by the end of the year, so guests have a clean, healthy, and safe environment for living.

The Bryan Area Foundation awarded a \$2,500 grant to the Williams County Special Olympics to assist in paying for athletes and coaches to attend the 2025 Summer Games. Held in Columbus over a weekend, the monies will help pay for hotels, meals, and entry fees. This past summer, Williams County had 26 athletes, and nine coaches participate in the games, and they anticipate even more competitors in 2025.

PIP now has 98 members. Current members can renew their membership for 2025 by scanning the QR code to the right or by mailing a check. Renewals are requested by Friday, January 10, 2025. Once again, the commitment is \$250 for the year. The first \$50 goes towards the endowment fund, and \$50 is payable at or before each quarterly meeting. If you desire, the entire \$250 may be paid up front when renewing.

During the 4th quarter meeting, 3 nominations were made representing three different groups. They were as follows:

Toys for Tots: Nominated by Pheba Baneriee-Sam and presented by Cheryl Andres. this program has collected toys for children during Christmas time for 28 years. Collection boxes are distributed throughout Williams County and all those wishing for toys sign up through the Toys for Tots website. In 2023, \$32,000 was donated to the nonprofit enabling them to give 861 area children 2 to 3 toys each. The PIP monies would help the program purchase toys for even more youth during the holidays.

Cancer Assistance of Williams County: Cheryl Andres nominated and presented this nonprofit, which serves people in Williams County diagnosed with cancer. They give patients \$1,500 to offset expenses related to their illness such as gas cards, lodging, and supplies not covered by insurance. A PIP grant would give Cancer Assistance of Williams County more money to assist these individuals. Thank you to our ladies from

PIP who decorated a tree for **Compassion Medical Clinic:** The last presentation, nominated and presented by new member Diane Ullom, was for Compassion Medical Clinic. Opened in 2007, they help those without insurance or with a deductible higher than \$2,500 to receive non-emergency health care. They operate primarily on donations with only one paid employee and all medical staff volunteering their time. Currently housed at the First Church of


